"When I was 22 in Trinidad, I saw the interaction between patients and staff and I was inspired to enter this field," she says of her first training at St. James Medical. "In a civil nursing class in Trinidad, we had a professor from Jamaica who said, 'When you see a patient you always try to do your best, never your second best.' I live by that." Bowen chose the healthcare field because she loves communicating with and



meeting people from different cultures.

Bowen is the charge nurse in the sub-acute unit which caters for patients who no longer require hospital care but need skilled nursing and rehabilitative care that can not be supplied at home, in an outpatient facility, or in a nursing home. As charge nurse, she supervises and supports the nurses in her unit. She also works with paraplegics, people afflicted by strokes and dialysis patients. The unit does rehabilitation work in building upper body strength and walking.

Claudia Diamond nominated this RN, who is now helping a certified nurse assistant with tuition to get her training, says "Ms. Bowen is a caring person who listens carefully to patients' needs and addresses their concerns. She assists co-workers financially to go back to school."


